Many thanks to everyone for the messages of condolences you sent me for the loss of my brother. I can't thank you enough for the care and concern you extended to me while I was recovering from covid. I was truly blessed by your messages, cards and phone calls. *Thank you!*

The fall season seems to have come quickly – I am very thankful for the beautiful fall days we have had here in Southern Alberta; there were many days of clear, sunny skies and spectacular colours..

It is good to hear from the various UCWs and women's groups within our network. Over this long haul dealing with the pandemic, UCW groups have had to make many changes in the way they meet and plan events. Thank You and Blessings to all of you to keep your groups active in whatever way you can.

The National UCW gathering was held via Zoom the week of September 20th for 2-3 hours per day. The Theme was "Walking with Love in the Holy Spirit's Power". Early in the week, the financial statements were presented and approved. The National UCW Executive moved to donate \$10,000.00 to Women for Change – Zambia and \$5, 000, 00 to the Healing Fund of the UCC. The main speaker was Adel Halliday, the Anti-Racism and Equity Lead with UCC. The goal of the Church is to engage in a long-term Anti-Racism Plan and become an Anti-Racism Denomination. An ongoing program called 40 Days of Engagement has been developed. (detailed information can be found on the UCC website). Adel reminded us to engage in this journey "Along with God".

Amy Crawford, Team Lead, Identity ad Mission, led us in Bible Study based on the Book of Mark. Participants broke into 'rooms' and the discussed the various verses which were assigned to each group. Rev Japhet Ndhlovu, Executive Minister to Church in Mission, conducted the closing worship and communion service and installed our new National UCW President, Nancy Risto.

The Full Executive of UCW Chinook Winds and Northern Spirit met via Zoom on 29th Oct. Many Thanks to Margery Wright, Past President, for 'filling in for me' and chairing the meeting. Rev Larry Wright conducted the opening worship service with Communion. The service was based on Scriptures from Deuteronomy 26 (First Fruits and Tithes) and John 4 (Jesus and the Woman of Samaria).

A letter of encouragement from Carolle Dallas-Arbuckle, National UCW Treasurer, was read. She has been receiving emails and phone calls from UCWs contemplating closing their UCW groups. Carolle advises that “now is not the time to make those decisions” – take time to stop, breath, rest and just enjoy being a UCW Woman”. The complete letter can be found on Page 9 of the Banner.

Sharon Prenevost, Advocacy Committee Chair, reported on Glasgow Multi-Faith Declaration for COP26. “Our faith communities are united in caring for human life and the natural world”. The complete document can be found on Page 5 of the Banner.

Plans for our 2022 AGM were discussed. The FCJ Centre, Calgary, has been tentatively booked for April 21 – 23rd, 2022. We have a speaker booked – Claire McMordie, a member of Scarborough United, Calgary, will be speaking about the process involved in sponsoring a refugee. A decision has to be made by 1 Dec 2021 whether we wish to meet in person at FCJ Centre or via Zoom. An email will be circulated to pole our network of women and determine whether we meet in person or via Zoom.

Report from our Advocacy Chair:

Climate change summit COP26 (Conference of the Parties) is in Glasgow, Scotland from October 31-November 12, 2021. Fifty Senior Faith leaders from Scotland and across the UK have collaborated in creating a Multi-Faith Declaration for COP26. Signatories to the statement include leaders from: many Christian, Muslim, Hebrew, Hindu, Sikh, Zoroastrian, Baha'i, Quaker, Salvation Army, Ahlul Bayt and Jain faiths. At about the middle of the page of the **Glasgow Multi-Faith Declaration for COP26** (see below) find three bullets with actions that you and possibly your community might take in addressing climate change.

Glasgow Multi-Faith Declaration for COP26

Our faith communities are united in caring for human life and the natural world. We share a belief in a hopeful future, as well as an obligation to be responsible in caring for our common home, the Earth.

We recognise the opportunities that COP26 brings in addressing the urgent need for action in limiting the effects of climate change and the critical importance of decisions made in this conference to take forward the agreement made in Paris in 2015.

People have exploited the planet, causing climate change. We recognise that the burden of loss and damage falls most heavily on people living in poverty, especially women and children.

We acknowledge the commitments made through the Lambeth Declaration in 2015. Now, because of the gravity of our situation, the impact of climate change around the world, and the inequality of its effects we seek to strengthen those commitments. We commit to respond to this challenge by:

- Reflecting deeply in prayer, meditation and worship to discern how to care for the earth and each other, and to encourage our respective communities to do the same.
- Making transformational change in our own lives and in the lives of our communities through individual and collective action.
- Being advocates for justice by calling on governments, businesses and others who exercise power and influence to put into effect the Paris agreement; to make the transition to a just and green economy a priority; and to commit to science-based targets that are aligned with a healthy, resilient, zero-emissions future.

We remind governments of their commitments made in Paris in 2015 to limit global warming to 1.5 degrees, and of Article 17 of the Universal Declaration on Bioethics and Human Rights to protect the environment, the biosphere and biodiversity. We call upon them to take the urgent action needed to avert the loss, damage, and forced migration threatened by climate change.

We look to governments to work together and with others to create a positive vision for 2050 where addressing climate change is not just an opportunity to stop burning fossil fuels, but also: to achieve cleaner air and water; to reduce food waste; to ensure a just and equitable sharing of the earth's resources; and to protect the habitats we share with all other life on whose health we also depend.

Across our doctrinal and political differences, we know that we must change our ways to ensure a quality of life which all can share, and we need to provide hope for people of all ages, everywhere, including future generations. To offer hope in the world we need to have confidence that those in power understand the vital role they have to play at the Glasgow COP26. 2 Our collective energy and prayers will be with those working for a successful outcome.

Updated Info Banners:

Important information regarding Banners.

All banners should be 3 feet wide by 4 feet long.

All banners should have 3 tabs along the top (one on each end and one at the center 18 inches in from the end).

All tabs should be cut 12 inches long so that when folded in half to make a loop and sewn on your banner there will be room to hang down from the tube system. The longer loop is necessary because the tube is 3 inches in diameter.

Banners will be paraded in at the opening ceremony on Monday evening, July 11th by 2 people from each Region. All banner carriers will be directed to a place to line up. You will be following the drummers and dancers.

Please have a short write up (4-5 lines) printed about your banner which includes the name of your Region and brief description of the banner. These will be given to the emcee who will read them as you are walking up.

After all banner carriers are lined up on the floor in front of the stage, on a given signal, you will divide in the middle and lay your banner on the table by your side of the stage.

Banner carriers will then walk down the same side of the room that your banner was laid and back to your seat

All banners will be hung from the tube system

Banners will have to be taken down after the banquet on Thursday evening, July 14th to be ready for the banner carriers to walk out.

Banners will be piped out from the front sides of the stage towards the centre and down the middle aisle (a reverse of the way you entered on Monday)

Questions have been sent to the National UCW regarding the closing of Units, due to fewer members and not being able to join together for meetings. The following is a letter sent to one such Regional group, and it was felt that this reply should be shared among the general UCW members.

What should WE do?

Fellowship & UCW

An important part of belonging to UCW is the fellowship.

During the Covid-19 Pandemic we were not able to do that.

Our UCW lives changed. I personally realized how much I missed my sisters in Christ the longer I had to go without seeing them in person.

Our world and lives began to change, how we did things change. We discovered that for most of the time we did not have to leave our homes our computers and the internet had us connected to everything. I always had a big thank you and smile to the person who delivered my purchases. When I did need to leave the house it was usually only once a week or once every two weeks for groceries, the drugstore, that medical appointment. I noticed there was a big difference between what I needed to live and be happy and what I thought I wanted.

I notice that something else was taking place within UCW. I have had email communications and telephone calls from UCW women who are thinking that now is the time that maybe, just maybe they should close their UCW group. One part of me totally understands and there is another part of me that right now is screaming no, not yet, please do not let the pandemic be the excuse to close your UCW.

Now is not the time to make decisions, now is the time to stop, to breath, to rest, and to enjoy just being a UCW women. Many women can say that their age and mobility is the reason they can no longer be UCW. I get you, my body sure can not do the things it has done in the past. Many UCW groups no longer have the number of women needed to hold a fundraising event, why should they continue.

Please try this, while you spend time thinking about closing, I want you to consider staying open for another year. If the women can not submit your units membership dues than don't worry about that, please also don't worry about Mission & Service or the National UCW special project, Women for Change – Zambia. Things will fall into place when God is ready.

Take this time to just be friends, be UCW friends, call each other, if you are able to go outside and meet with social distancing try doing that. If you are able to share a meal together to that. Know that being together is fellowship, is service as you support and encourage each other. If you are comfortable sharing your faith (a good way to do this is if you are able to get your Minister's sermon or are attending church, discuss what your minister said), this can really lead to study and witnessing of your faith.

The General Council have given a grant each year to the NUCW To partly cover the cost of the meeting, and the funds have come from the M & S. If each member of the UCW across the country gave \$1 per member per year, the cost of the meeting would be covered, and no M & S funds would be required. Travel is not cheap and it is only once a year that the Presidents of all Conferences across the United Church UCW's meet to co-ordinate work, mingle and learn the work being done by the other UCW Conferences. KEEPING IN TOUCH.

The first issue was sent out earlier this year, and a second issue was sent out in June. The distribution is from National UCW to contacts in the various regions, and those contacts are asked for forward to their contacts in the various areas. It should eventually trickle down to each local UCW group, and from their to each member of the UCW. The committee are hoping that eventually all women of the United Church, will be able to read about all the projects etc., for which the UCW is known, and what is going on around the country.

FOOTHILLS UCW PRESBYTERIAL.

Foothills Presbyterial have been trying over the last two years to arrange a Meet & Greet with the ladies of the Foothills Presbyterial, and inviting the ladies from the other areas of the Region (3) to join them. Foothills Presbyterial is the only working or operating Presbyterial in our Region, and as such are hoping to be able to keep this organization going to enable the ladies throughout the Region to keep in touch and to be included as part of our group.

If it is determined that the ladies throughout the Region would like to keep attending and meeting and greeting, then a new committee (Executive) will be formed to work out the ways and means of gathering and distributing information to the ladies of the Region.

We are hoping to hold our Meet & Greet at Camp Chestermere on 31st March, 2022. More information will be available in January.

THE AGATHA KAASA BURSARY FUND.

This is a bursary for Women of the United Church sponsored by the National UCW.

The **Agatha Kaasa Bursary Fund** was established by the National UCW in 2003. The fund is fully supported by a bequest left by Agatha Kaasa, for women's work in the church.

You will find more information on this remarkable woman in the National UCW Handbook.

Who can apply?

Any woman who is part of The United Church of Canada and is NOT in paid accountable ministry.

What kind of requests does the fund support?

Leadership training and education.:

Continuing education :

Projects or events that promote education, mission, outreach, spiritual nurture, and ecumenical and interfaith dialogue, locally or abroad.

(Note: Formal theological education is not funded, for example, M.Div. and D.Min degrees. Centre for Christian Studies programmes or similar programmes.)

How much money does the bursary fund offer?

The recipient can receive up to one third of the total expenses related to the request, with a maximum bursary of \$1,500.

Will all requests be funded?

Requests will be funded at the discretion of the bursary committee, as funds permit.

How often can individuals apply for a bursary?

Applicants can apply once a year,.

Preference will be given to first –time applicants.

Application Procedure:

The applicant must submit **PRIOR TO THE EVENT:**

- A detailed description of the programme, project, or event.
- Total costs related to the request (travel, accommodation, registration, meals etc.
- Other sources of revenue

We encourage women of the church to attend events related to the work and development of the United Church.
