You may wish to consider exploring a partnership:



... if there are partnership options available to you.

Is there another Community of Faith with whom you could partner in some way?

There are many different forms this partnership could take: <u>click here for examples.</u>

Consider factors such as geographic proximity, as well as what resources, gifts, and contexts each partner would bring.

... if you are both able and willing to embrace significant change as a community.

It is important to acknowledge that your community will not be able to enter a partnership or amalgamation unchanged.

What will this mean for your community?



... if a change in your community's Ministry Personnel and/or Lay Staff is feasible.

If there is a pre-existing vacancy in a Community of Faith, this could facilitate some forms of partnership, including Amalgamation.

If there is no vacancy, there are many possible staffing considerations.

Sometimes a Minister must be willing to take on new and different roles, in some cases a new Call must be created, and the roles and numbers of Lay Staff must also be considered.

You may wish to consider Disbanding:



... if your Community has less than 12 months of finances available to you.

Ideally, if your Community's finances might not stretch to cover the next 2 years, you will start to consider your options.

Tools to help gauge your Community's financial situation include the Region's Financial and Ministry Viability Assessment.

When to consider: Disbanding



... if human resources to maintain the viability of your Church have dwindled.

Have your human resources have dwindled beyond the ability to maintain united church requirements? For example, can you maintain a board, a chair, a treasurer, trustees, etc.?



... if your Church has migrated towards another denomination.

If your congregation is no longer in compliance with the polity of the United Church of Canada, you must formally disband as a United Church Community of Faith.



... if there are no partnerships available to you in your area or situation.

Amalgamation with a partner congregation may not be a viable option for your community, because of geographical, financial, faithful, or other considerations.
